The following is the confession of John D. Lee, which appeared in the Fan Francisco Chronicle and New York Herald, on Wednesday last:

Carry out the instructions of these in authority. If you are detiful in this, your reward shall be great "

for Ge i will bleas those who aboy our conncile and make all things fit for the people of the Lord in their days." On the way home I passed many Indiana out on the war path. I promised to join them the next day. On Theaday morning the Indiana attached the train just at dathight, and killed soren and wounded action emigrants. The indiana lost some of their warriors. The emigrants then fortified their position and the Indiana surrounced them and sout for may. The whole country was aroused, both white and Indiana rushing to Mountaid Meadows from all directions. I arrived at the ramp late on Tuesday, and found the Indiana fullars force. It ey demanded that I abou'd.

I EAD THE ATTACK.

I refused until otdors were rore val from Haight or Damo. I went south ten miles, mut the whites and ledians coming from the south and camped there that night. On Wedneyday I went to the Meadows and sent a man to Cedar City for forther orders. On Thursday the orders came by Mejor Highes. There were fifty-eight whites and about five hundred Indians there then, i Major Digbee made a speech. He send the omigrants were all to bekilled. These who could talk must get them out of their forthfleations by treachery. I was to follow

The other man, who was wounded by White and Arthur, ascaped and carried word to the emigrants that the white had come to help the forders. William O Slowart was the most bloodthingly of any one there. He cut throats just for amusement. Klingen Smith, Behr op at Cedar, killed a man. Everyone these took pert in the killing, as a religious duty. We were then in the midst of the crossment of the reformation, and believed by the teachings of our leaders that

that the Mormone were to conquer the world, and at once inherit all the wealth of the nuiverse. Obtilit was to come and rule one thensand years, and Mormon decirings were to be universally accepted. We were the followers of fano teachers. I have failed a vielim to the foolish and wicked men that I believed almost divide. I have had eighten wives, and eleven of them have been diversed from me by Brigham houng. Three still remain true to me, and have clubg to me during my imprisonment. I am

Agatha Ann Wooleoy in 1633 and moved to kayette county, lihaots, on bucker creak, There I became wealthy, In 1836 I became acquainted with some fraveling Mormon proschery. I bought, read and bollowed the Book of Mormon. I sold my property in Illinois and moved to Far West'in Missource in 1857, where I joined the Mormon Church and became intimately acquainted with Joseph Bmith, Brighum You, g. and o her leaders of the Church of Janua Christ of Latter-day Faints. I was sub-sequently initiated into the order of Danitos at its first formation. The members of this order were colomnly sworn to obey all the orders of the pricethood of the Mormoa Church, to do any and all things as commandel,

My journals and private writlags have been destroyed by order of firigham Young, and I have nothing left bat my memory to give the account of the feat d: 668 done in God & pame during the yours when Brigham Young was chief and ruler In Utsh. I know of many murders, casitations and robberns.

COMMITED BY CREEK OF THE PRESSUOOD, all of which I have fully stated in my writings delivered to my storney, W. W. Disbop. I have told the whole truth, and the God I am soon to meet face to face knows my sesertions are nothing but the truth."

The Monntain Meadows Massacro was the result of the direct teachings of Brigham Yonng, and it was done by order of these high in authority in the Mormon community.
